There is a common conversation when you live on a lake... "I've never seen it this low" or "I've never seen it this high" referring to lake water levels.

Which got our Barlow Lake resident John Trygier, who lives in Area 5, thinking what is a "normal" lake level. So for almost 2 years now John has been tracking and recording the lake level, monitoring the amount of rain fall, temperature and number of sunny days, reviewing water levels at the Bowens Mill Dam and reviewing other lake level impact events. John estimates it may take up to 5 years to see possible trending patterns.

Over time, John hopes to be able to say "the lake goes up and the lake goes down" with actual data he has been recording. We enjoy reading his lake level updates on the Barlow Lake FB page! Thank you, John for taking time to gather data and share how much the lake levels can change over time with significant changes from rain events, temperatures and other potential impacts to the lake level.




### **LIGHT UP THE NIGHT - VENETIAN BOAT PARADE**
















#### A Peek Into The



## Past and Present



In 1925, at just 17 years old, Ray Tuer bought property on Barlow Lake. That property would become a family cottage. Ray would marry and have three children (Bob, Katie and Tom) with grand children to follow. Like so many families on the lake, the cottage became an important part of their

family's summer tradition. In fact, four generations of the family have created amazing memories on this water.

At just 2 months old, Terri Duff, Katie's daughter and the first grandchild (Ray's favorite - his words, not mine) had her first introduction to Barlow Lake. Her uncle dipped her feet in the lake marking the beginning of Terri's connection to this place/ this water.

As children, Terri and her 2 brothers (Jim and Mike) spent whole weeks in the summer at the cottage with Grandma and Grandpa Tuer. Grandpa would drop them off, go home to his job in the city and join them on the weekends. Imagine: no phone, no TV, no distractions, just a row boat, a canoe and a lake to explore, friends to make and comic books to read. In these early days Terri remembers her grandpa waking her up to sit with him in a lawn chair simply watching the lake and learning the bird calls. That memory still brings a smile to her face and a tear to her eye.

During one of those visits, at just 10 years old Terri proclaimed, "I need to live here when I grow up."

Hanging on the raft with friends was a typical 70s/80s summer day.



And so it was, in 1986 Terri bought the family cottage and began renovation to a year round home. Her daughter Katie, 4th generation was born and raised on Barlow Lake with stories and memories of her own.



Multiple changes to the property have taken place, but changes to her love of the lake never have. A wonderful community of friends, neighbors, family and the water make this a special place to call home.



### **Birds** on Barlow Lake



Have you noticed a few new birds that seem to want to live here at Barlow Lake?

Specifically, a couple of black birds—one that soars and one that swims. The large black birds with the bald red heads are common "turkey vultures", which are actually classified as raptors (kind of like a dinosaur, kids!). The good news is, these large, soaring birds do not kill for their next meal but only eat carrion (dead stuff) In fact, their heads are featherless so that they don't get sick from all the "junk food" they stick their heads into! The not so good news, as we have seen on Barlow, is they like to roost in larger numbers.



Vultures are protected birds, so what do you do if they become a nuisance? Scaring them off is the best plan of attack. You can make noise, spray water, and hang balloons or flags in the area. Vultures fear owls, so getting owl decoys that you can easily move may help. Removing dead branches and trees is suggested to reduce their roosting options near your home. Another option, though a bit macabre in nature, is to hang a dead vulture effigy near where they roost. What do you say, it's almost Halloween...just call it décor!

The swimming black birds are Cormorants, a sea bird that has migrated to Michigan. These birds are similar to the loons we see and hear from time to time, but these super fishing birds are not beneficial to Barlow. Cormorants are



invasive birds that will create competition on our lake for other bird species and reduce overall fish population and fish variety if left undeterred. The Cormorants can swallow a nine-inch fish in one bite and have been known to decimate young fish populations causing serious decline in future years. These birds are also protected by law: however, special permits are available to reduce numbers where necessary.

Consider discouraging Cormorants from beginning to colonize on your property at Barlow Lake. Reduce their nesting options where possible and install bird spikes or a bird spider (which looks like a large wire spider). You can also use the same methods mentioned above for scaring off these birds, but you won't need to hang fake birds in your trees, this time!
